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## New announcing regulations – from August 2013 – The 1♣ Opening and the 1NT Opening.

When partner opens 1♣, **you** announce the minimum number of Clubs she holds. You no longer need to alert the 1♣ bid, just tell the opponents immediately how many Clubs she holds. "3 or more Clubs" or "2 or more Clubs". Don't say "better minor" or "could be short". If you play any conventional meaning to the 1♣ opening, then explain that as well. When partner opens 1NT, you announce the point range, eg "15 to 17".

# **Tuesday Night Lessons**

## Competitive Bidding 7:30pm – 10pm

# Tuesday September 3<sup>rd</sup>: Support Doubles

Opener can use a Double to differentiate three- and fourcard support for responder's suit. Learn when to use these Doubles and how they apply to be a better competitive bidder.

# **Tuesday September 10<sup>th</sup>: Using Redoubles**

Learn to use the least-used call in the game. Redouble can have a variety of meanings, this lesson describes the most common uses.

# **Tuesday September 17<sup>th</sup>: Competitive Raises**

To make it hard for your opponents to bid, use Weak Jump Raises in a competitive auction to cut them out. Learn to use Cue-Raises to show stronger hands. Also, adjust your contested bidding when you are the opening or overcalling team.

The lessons will be held in the Judith Wright Room (Front Room) at the New South Wales Writers' Centre, Rozelle.

#### **Bidding Quiz ANSWERS:**

In most situations you should take the bidding slowly, investigate a fit and then decide on the level.

When responding to a takeout Double, the situation is not quite the same, because you usually know which suit is your best fit immediately. Also, you are obligated to respond to a Double, so partner can't assume anything about your hand when you make your responding bid.

# On this hand, the bids to avoid are 1♥, 1♠ and 1NT.

If you bid any of these, partner will assume that you were forced to bid, and that your hand is awful (less than 10 points).

To invite partner to game after a Double, you need to jump the bidding.

On this hand 2♥, 2♠ or 2NT are all good bids.

They show about 10 - 12 points and partner can make a sensible decision about how high we should go.

The only problem with bidding 2♥ or 2♠ is that you might choose partner's worst Major, and be in the wrong suit.

I think that the best bid here is 2♦ – a cue bid of the opponent's suit. A cue bid here says: "I have a good hand, I am interested in game, but I need some help from you to choose trumps".

Partner will bid her best suit (probably 2♥ or 2♠) and then you can raise her suit.

#### **Competitive Bidding Tip:**

In the middle of most contested auctions, a cue-bid of the opponent's suit says: "I am looking for game, but I don't know exactly where we are going. I don't have a clear bid to make." Partner responds naturally, and the bidding continues.



## **Bridge Refresher Days**

#### **Suit Combination Quiz ANSWERS:**

How do you play this suit for the most number of tricks? You can lead from any hand.

♣ KQ43 (Dummy)

♣ 87652 (You)

This one is very commonly misplayed — especially if the lead starts in Dummy. If the four missing Clubs split 2-2 then you will only lose a trick to the Ace. If they split 3-1 or 4-0 then you at risk of losing more than one trick. You can handle poor breaks a bit easier if the Ace doesn't capture your King or Queen. Lead a low Club from your hand towards the King. If the King wins, then West probably has the Ace, so return to your hand with a different suit and lead towards the Queen.

Answer: With no opposition bidding I would just play the ♠A and ♠K playing for the Queen to drop.

With a nine-card fit missing the Queen, the drop is more likely than a finesse, although not by much.

Answer: With East overcalling 1♦, I would assume that East has the ♠Q to make up her required points for an overcall. I think West has the ♣KQJ to lead one, rather than lead her partner's overcalled suit. That doesn't leave many points for East, so I think she must have the ♦KQJ and the ♠Q and probably the ♥J.

If there has been a bid against you, try to count the outstanding points! The bidder probably has 12+ for an opening and 10+ for an overcall.

If East has the Queen of Spades (my guess) then I would play the  $\triangle$ A and then finesse to the  $\triangle$ T.

Answer: With East pre-empting 3◆, I would assume that West has the ♠Q. East has 7 Diamonds – West has no Diamonds. This leaves only 6 non-Diamond cards for East, and 13 non-Diamond cards for West. East easily has enough points to pre-empt, even with only the ◆KQJ, she doesn't need any more points.

If a person is known to have a lot of cards in one suit (a pre-empt, or they have rebid a suit), they are far less likely to hold a specific card in *another* suit.

If West has the Queen of Spades (my guess) then I would play the AK and then finesse to the AJ.

### **Results Recap for July:**

The "Average of best 3 scores" is calculated by taking the average of your three best sessions played with the same partner in the same session over the month. If a session has 4 or 5 weeks, then you get to drop one or two of your scores in the calculations. The Ratings score is calculated over 3, 4 or 5 weeks and is a handicap style system of comparing results. More information to come in the next month or two!
