New Session on Wednesday Morning!

Starting on Wednesday July 10th we will be running a new session on Wednesday Mornings at the Writer's Centre, Rozelle.

The session will begin at 10am with an Intermediate lesson for about an hour. The lesson will involve a short introduction of a topic and then playing four hands and analysing them. There will be notes and hand records provided and you can ask questions at any stage. Then from 11am until 1pm there will be an Intermediate level duplicate game with expert supervision available. You are welcome to come to the lesson only, or the duplicate, or both. You don't need to book, or bring a partner, just turn up.

The topics covered in July will be Competitive Bidding, and are suitable for club players at all levels, except beginners.

July 10th: Overcalls & Responding July 17th: Takeout Doubles & Responding July 24th: Handling Interference July 31st: Competitive Bidding Judgement

Costs:

We are very happy to accommodate players without partners to all games, just turn up 15 minutes before game time and let us know.

Suit Combination ANSWERS:

How do you play this suit for the most number of tricks? You can lead from any hand.

1) ♥ AK43 (Dummy)

♥ J1098 (You)

The goal here is to make four tricks, and not lose any. With an 8-card fit missing the Queen, the odds are to finesse. Best play is to lead the \P A first (in case of a singleton Queen) and then cross to hand with a different suit and lead the \P J, planning to play low from Dummy unless the \P Q is played.

You will make four tricks if the Queen is a singleton, or if it is on your left hand side.

And how about this suit?

♣ J654 (You)

This suit looks the same as the previous one, but this time you don't have the \bigstar 10 or \bigstar 9. You can't afford to lead an honour for a finesse unless you have the adjacent honour. If you lead the \bigstar J and it gets covered with the \bigstar Q then you will still lose a trick to the \bigstar 10 or \bigstar 9.

The best odds here are to simply play the A and K hoping the Q drops. If it does, you will make all four tricks. If it doesn't, then you are likely to make three tricks.

Bidding Problem ANSWER:

Your partner opens 1 + playing Standard with a better minor.

Here is your hand:

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۷	J32
٠	KQ875
÷	Q943

What would you respond?

Assuming you play normal limit raises, I would bid simply 2, despite having 8 HCP and a singleton. If you add 3 additional points for the singleton and you bid 3, (11-12), partner will hopefully bid game, but might go for 3NT, avoiding the dreaded 5-of-a-minor. Great bidding from partner! When you put down your dummy in 3NT, she will ask where your 11 points are. Good question!

As a general rule, don't get too carried away adding shortage points when raising minors if playing in No-Trumps is still an option.

If you play Inverted Minor raises, then you should bid $3 \Leftrightarrow$ (pre-emptive) rather than $2 \Leftrightarrow (10/11 + \text{points})$.
