DIRECTORS' REPORT

The directors of New South Wales Bridge Association Limited present their report on the company for the year ended 30th September 2003.

DIRECTORS

The names and qualifications of the directors of the company in office at any time during the year are:

Keiran Crowe-Mai, Chairman

Keiran has served on the NSWBA Council for eight years. During that time he was involved in the following portfolios - Secretary for 3 years, Rules & Ethics for 2 years, Appeals for 3 years, Juniors Councillor for 3 years and 2 including 2003 as Chairman. He won the 1993 State and Australian Open Pairs played for the NSW Juniors in 1994 and 1995, and won the Interstate competition in 1995, represented NSW at the ANC pairs in 1996 and 1999 and made the quarter finals of the NZ open Teams in 1999 and 2001. His bridge history dates back about 17 years. He is currently employed as a business analyst at AMP.

John William De Ravin, Secretary

John has played bridge for eighteen years and became Secretary of the NSWBA in his first year on Council, 2000/2001. He came second in the Gold Coast Pairs in 2002, won the NSW Mixed Teams and a number of congress events in 2003 and is planning more successes at the table! NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH SEPTEMBER 2003

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views and the Corporations Act 2001.

NSW Bridge Association Limited is a public company limited by guarantee.

The financial report has been prepared on the accrual basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or current valuations of non-current assets. Cost is based on the fair values of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the company adopted in the preparation of this financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Income Tax

No provision has been made for income tax as the economic entity is exempt in accordance with the terms of Section 50-45 of the Income Tax Assessment Act, 1997.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. The cost of product inventories are determined on a first in first out basis.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or deemed cost, where applicable, less any accumulated depreciation.

The carrying amount of property, plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including building and capitalised lease assets, but excluding freehold land, are depreciated on a straight line basis over their useful lives to the company commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Properties held for investment purposes are not subject to depreciation. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the company's liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee entitlements expected to be settled within one year together with entitlements arising from wages and salaries, annual leave and sick leave which will be settled after one year, have been measured at their nominal amount. Other employee entitlements payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those entitlements.

Contributions are made by the company to employee superannuation funds and are charged as expenses when incurred.

Cash

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash includes cash on hand and at call deposits with banks or financial institutions, investments in money market instruments and net of bank overdrafts.

Comparative Figures

Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon delivery of goods to customers.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon delivery of the service to the customers.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as

part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Company Limited By Guarantee

Every member of the company undertakes, in accordance with the Memorandum of Association of the company, to contribute such amount (not exceeding 1 pound) as may be required in the event of the winding up of the company during the time that they are a member or within one year afterwards. As at 30th September 2003 the number of members was 676 (2002: 675).

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2003

Financial matters: In my 2001 Chairman's report I warned that the NSWBA faced a couple of tenebrous years. These years have now passed and we have come through them most admirably. Whilst we have reported a book loss this year of around \$14,000, we managed to make a small cash profit. This was achieved mainly due to the increase in table numbers in our regular duplicate sessions and the increasing of capitation fees paid by affiliated clubs and based on their 'home' membership numbers.

Since the closing of our financial year (30 Sept) we have sent to the ABF an amount of \$25,000 to reduce the amount we owe on the premises. We now owe \$200,000 on premises worth considerably more than that figure. However, we still do owe \$200,000 and we are required to pay this amount to the ABF by the year 2008. Accordingly and after considering there has been only one increase (GST related) in table money in the last 10 years and that there have been multiple capitation fee increases, council has decided to increase table money at all our sessions by \$1.00. The new rates will come into effect on January 1, 2004.

House Matters: Due primarily to a sedulous cadre of councillors the NSWBA is looking far far better than it has in many years. Many hours have been spent tidying up, painting, decorating etc. From comments received from both members and visitors to our premises we can definitely attribute some significant proportion of table number improvement to these efforts. After many years in inaccessible cupboards the library is once again running.

Events: With the new effulgent state of the NSWBA it was decided to move the Sydney Bridge Festival to the NSWBA. This was quite successful with the number of entries increasing. Numbers in the finals of the State Open Pairs and the State Mixed Pairs were pleasing. As previously reported duplicate table numbers continue to increase with Monday daytime nearly doubling in size. In recent months, for the first time in about 5 years, month on month comparisons for Tuesday daytime are on the increase. Monday nights is the one small concern here and council will be looking into ways to remedy this. Attendances at congresses around NSW are improving (on Sunday 25 May there were over 100 tables playing in congresses around NSW!) and this is a pleasant reversal on recent years.

TREASURER'S REPORT 2003

The Association made a small loss of nearly \$14,000 in the year ended 30 September 2003 (prior year: \$41,000 loss and in 2001, \$6,000 profit). About \$25,000 of the expenses are non-cash items - mostly depreciation of the premises, which are actually appreciating - so the cash position is materially better than appears at first sight. Cash on hand at year end is up \$6,000 from \$38,000 to \$44,000, after \$6,000 capital expenditure on furniture and fittings

This is a relatively good result, certainly better than 2002. My report last year foreshadowed a continuation of the poor result in 2002 because of ongoing high cyclical expenses (ANC in Darwin, and continuing high strata levies) which occurred as expected. The turnaround was attributable to increased income. Importantly, table numbers increased for the first time in several years. Increased capitation fees helped, and bringing the Sydney festival into our premises (and increased attendance at the festival) produced a profit where there was a loss last year. We have attracted increased sponsorship.

As noted above, table numbers were up. Non-championship sessions increased by over 10% (from 4452 in 2002 to 4923 in the current year). On the other hand, championship nights which contribute disproportionately because of entry fees were slightly down. The council made a number of changes this year which helped table numbers. The premises have been tidied up and repainted and the members should recognise the work done by some council members and other volunteers in this area. Negotiating a fixed \$5 parking fee at Goulbourn street was crucial, particularly with the loss of the use of VAG car park.

Despite the increase in table numbers we are really only back where we were about two years ago. However there is light at the end of the tunnel if the trend continues. Next year we have a relatively inexpensive ANC year (Melbourne) but the high strata levies continue. 2004/05 is critical, as we host the ANC that year. We are also anticipating some capital expenditure with the need for permanent partitioning and ongoing issues with air-conditioning in the summer months. Council continues to take steps to improve the financial position - the closing of the canteen on Monday nights and Tuesday will reduce losses we have been incurring, and we ask that members accept the slight reduction in service as being necessary.

The capital position of the Association remains very sound. Member equity is \$561,000, with the premises (and fittings) in the books at \$740,000. The premises had a market value of \$960,000 at the most recent valuation which was in March 1997. Given the increase in Sydney real estate prices since that time this is surely conservative. However we have not made any repayments on the premises loan in either of the past two years - the loan remains at \$225,000. Council needs to budget for surpluses in order to enable loan repayments to be made. For that reason, and because they have not been increased for many years other than when GST was introduced, I will be recommending to the incoming Council that table fees be increased by \$1 next year.

In considering the financial position, members should realise that the foresight of earlier Councils in purchasing our premises to an extent obscures the ongoing financial position. Without our own premises we would be faced with a rental bill of well over \$100,000 per annum for similar space (compared with loan interest and

depreciation of about \$35,000). So without our own premises we would be reporting significant losses each year.

Members can assist in many ways in keeping the association financially healthy. While we are the state association for bridge, we also run about 10 other duplicates a week. Attendance at these duplicates, and the state events are critical to our financial wellbeing. Play more bridge! Encourage your friends to play, or to learn to play. Importantly, be pleasant to your opponents at the table (even the one sitting opposite you!) - the more people enjoy playing at the association, the more they will play. If you have any constructive suggestions, please give them to Noella or any Councillor. If you have any complaints or problems, please make sure we hear of them - we are really on the side of the membership!

As usual, Noella has done sterling work both in maintaining the accounts impeccably, and in the day to day running of the premises. I would like to thank her for the work she does, and the cheery way she does it. I look forward to reporting a profit in 2003/04.

SPONSORSHIP & PROMOTIONS 2003

It has been my first year on the committee. Bridge is new to me overall and the committee, politics and procedures completely alien. There has been much to digest and much to become familiar with. It was also very unfamiliar territory for me, personally, to ask people or sponsors to just give us things. I took a training course (self funded) to make me more aware and confident in this portfolio. I actually came to understand that bridge has so much to offer to people and that it was actually easy to rave about. After three months I compiled a database of around 1,000 names and addresses to which we could contact and seek sponsorship. I sent out one large mailout but 99% were rejected with the exception of a couple of spot prizes. From the responses we received, even though our proposal was declined, allowed me to understand that the people or organisations that they did support touched the heart, so to speak. I understood that our cover letter or introduction had to be made more personal or touching if we wanted a positive outcome. We simply did not sound needy enough, neither did we sound important or special enough for sponsors to go out of their way to support us. After pondering for a while I thought the "spirit of community" might be the way to go. It has the sentiment to touch sponsors and it is something bridge actually does, wonderfully! Until I make the necessary time to create such a masterpiece I did not send any further correspondence out to hopeful new sponsors on my database for fear of losing an opportunity.

I would also like to give a heartfelt thank you to John Arkinstall and Elisabeth Rasmussen who were only ever a telephone call away should I require any information.

During the year we became acquainted with the promotion of the Waterfront. The Waterfront is Sydney's newest waterfront lifestyle. Great place to invest and retire in as well. With many thanks to Lynn and Lester Kalmin for pointing them in our direction. The congress was well attended for being a last minute thing and could be the leader for new ways of making bridge more exciting because of the prize money, yet, at the same time, hopefully, marketing sponsors or promoters products to potential buyers within our community.

Currently, we are to embark, if the committee agrees, on promoting bridge hand in hand with the Prince of Wales Medical Research Institute. If this goes ahead bridge can grow in numbers significantly as the campaign will try to focus on keeping one's mind active and keeping social and how this can assist in preventing degeneration of the brain. Bridge is a great example of an activity that combines both of these things. The plan will be to involve all of NSW in this campaign.

Our current sponsors are: De Bortoli wines. Sadly, a member of the De Bortoli family has just passed away. Safilo, the manufacturer of upmarket eyewear. NSWHealth & QUIT. QUIT donated \$3,300 for advertising this year in January towards beginners' lessons. This, combined with the college advertising and the leaflet drop saw a quantum leap in attendance. We have just applied for QUIT to support us for February 2004 lessons through advertising. (Waiting on response.) The Queensland Bridge Association has continued its sponsorship of prizes of free entry to the Pairs and Teams in the Gold Coast Congress next year (to the value of \$700). The Chateau Resort has generously continued with their sponsorship. Hoyts gave us a couple of passes and the same for the Maritime Museum. We are sincerely thankful for all of the above support.

The Sydney Morning Herald and the Sun Herald continue their support for bridge in NSW with their columns by Ron Klinger. In addition, the Sydney Morning Herald also generously sponsored the Dick Cummings Blue Ribbon Pairs at the Sydney Bridge Festival by donating \$500 for the trophy. Again, our special thanks.

We are also grateful for the support of the Department of Ageing, Disability & Home Care for it's grant of \$1,000 during Senior's Week which was well used. Also the Department of Sport & Recreation for \$5,000 for bridge promotions partly used for advertising of bridge lessons.

May next year yield us with the continued support of our current sponsors as well as bring us many new sponsors.

Many thanks to these and our other regular directors Matthew McManus and David Griffiths.

FABC REPORT 2003

It is my pleasure to present my report for the period to June 30th, 2003.

During the year the FABC organised qualifying competitions for the State Mixed Pairs, the State Open Pairs and the State Open Teams (both Country section and Metropolitan section). The Interclub Teams Competition was not run again this year due to lack of interest.

Carolyn MOLLOY was convenor for the SMP, Matt BLACKHAM for both the SOT-Country and Metro and Val Cummings for the SOP. Val was also convenor for the State Wide Pairs. All of these events were successful.

The annual country representatives meeting was held in May this year and all but one of the country representatives were in attendance. There was discussion on a wide range of issues and the weekend was a great success.

Pauline Gumby has taken over managing the web site and there has been significant improvement in the site.

The secretarial duties were spread among the various council members this year and this made operations difficult. Consequently council determined to employ a part time secretary and Susan Allen was appointed to the position.

I would like to complete this brief overview of the year by thanking all the committee members who donate their time selflessly and who work for a better administration of bridge in NSW. I especially wish to mention Gay Marx who has given many years of service but who proposes to stand down at the end of the year.
